We are thrilled to welcome 21 year old Swedish-Norwegian violinist Johan Dalene to Bold Tendencies for the first time. Playing with his regular performance partner, award-winning British pianist Nicola Eimer, Dalene delivers a programme for the concrete spaces that delves into the prescient crises of our time, delivered with his characteristic extreme virtuosity and sensitivity.

Dalene's violin career began when he was 4 years old; three years later he made his professional concert debut. Le Monde has praised his capacity to "make his Stradivarius sing like a master"; his ability to engage with musicians and audiences alike, coupled with his honest musicality, has won him many admirers internationally.

The brutal setting of our multi-storey car park offers the perfect frame for Dalene's exploration in music of the dilemmas that plague our contemporary society. Dalene's programme may best be described as an investigation of human precarity.

Our evening begins with Arvo Pärt's *Fratres (Brothers)*. A dissonant melody symbolises the ongoing conflict between humankind and the universe; Pärt has said that his music is often about how "the instant and eternity are struggling within us".

Pärt's study of struggle speaks to the effect of our present actions on our potential future. This theme of the resonance of war is continued in the presentation of Francis Poulenc's *Sonata*. Dedicated to the Spanish poet Frederico Garcia Lorca, who was shot by fascists in 1936, it constitutes a manifesto against the bloody struggles that claim lives and threaten fundamental rights and values. Released in 1943,

the work debuted during Poulenc's time in occupied Paris. Heavy with overtones of suffering and sadness, the *Sonata* frames the devastation of blood and struggle.

Civilisation's precarity is tackled from a different perspective in Sam Wu's *Waterways*, which paints a vision of New York City, depopulated as a result of climate change and rising sea levels. The music weaves a fantastical cityscape wholly occupied by fish - a post-human environment of corals growing out of skyscrapers, along streets and across avenues.

The programme concludes with the exaltation of our environment, with Edvard Grieg's Second Sonata, a reminder that we humans are but just a brief interlude in the history of the earth. Accentuating the fact that nature existed long before humanity, and will remain long after our time, the work promotes the hope that, should we come to our senses, we may ensure the planet's fruitful longevity.

Johan Dalene (b. 2000) is a Swedish-Norwegian violinist. Awarded the prestigious Norwegian Soloist Prize at First Prize at the Carl Nielsen Competition in 2019, he has since risen in international acclaim, culminating in his selection as an ECHO Rising Star (2021-22). In 2023 Dalene made his debut in America, staging a series of recitals at New York's Carnegie Hall and San Francisco's Davies Symphony Hall.

**Nicola Eimer** is British Pianist, and founding member of the Eimer Piano Trio. A regular performer for the London Chopin Society, Eimer has received numerous prizes from bodies such as the Royal Overseas League, and the Tillett Trust, as well as a Fulbright Scholarship to study at the Juilliard School in New York. Alongside her performance career, Eimer serves as an Associate of the Royal Academy of Music.
