Artist and choreographer Eve Stainton makes their Bold Tendencies debut, with the World Premiere of *The Joystick and The Reins*. Exploring how threat is constructed and maintained in society, the work interrogates the instrumentalisation of marginalised groups through systems of oppression and authoritarianism. Spanning influences including historical reenactments, police and riot arrest imagery, and 1980s *Crimewatch* episodes, *The Joystick and The Reins* is emblematic of Stainton's community–rooted practice – their interest in how differently marginalised people come into relationship with power structures and societal conventions.

Imagery and scenes are committed to a 'memory bank' that Stainton draws on as movement vocabulary throughout each performance, allowing these images to cycle through like a warped, overlapping playlist. The piece progresses through hyper-emotional states of intensity and choreographic distortion, examining what it means to reconstruct a theatrical scene that draws on truth. The scene and solo figure become a site for the audience's own projections: power, dominance, perpetrator, victim, threat and interpretation.

Stainton is accompanied by the 52 players of Sinfonia Smith Square Orchestra conducted by Jack Sheen, playing Ennio Morricone's seminal

score for sci-fi horror blockbuster *The Thing* (1982). Performed live in full for the first time in history the score was specially prepared for the project by the Morricone Estate, from the composer's handwritten manuscripts as he left them in Rome where he died in 2020. Celebrated for his ability to intensify affect and emotion, Morricone is credited by *The Thing* director John Carpenter as imbuing the film with a "deep, tragic sense that this is the end of things, of everything." A stark evocation of dread and demise, Morricone's score finds resonance with Stainton's mutual exploration of societal suspicion, psychological horror, and the devastating potential of individual isolation.

Eve Stainton is a Manchester-born, London-based artist and choreographer, who creates multi-disciplinary performances. Their research is rooted in community, interested in how differently marginalised people experience and come into relationship with power structures and societal conventions. Often working with codes or tropes of gender, class and threat, they reveal 'behind the scenes' mechanisms of working together to show a kind of reality that isn't seamless. Notable presentations include at the ICA, Venice Biennale performance programme in collaboration with Florence Peake, Dampfzentrale, Donaufestival, Le Guess Who?, Bergen Kunsthall and Tangente amongst others.

Ennio Morricone worked as an orchestrator, conductor and composer for theatre, radio and cinema. Alongside over 100 classical works, Morricone composed more than 400 scores for cinema and television, most famously for Sergio Leone's spaghetti westerns including *The Good, The Bad and the Ugly* (1966) and Quentin Tarantino's *The Hateful Eight* (2015). Morricone's numerous accolades include two Academy Awards, three Golden Globes, six BAFTAs, and the Golden Lion Honorary Award.

Jack Sheen is a conductor and composer from Manchester whose practice blends orchestral traditions with an expansive interdisciplinary perspective. He has conducted some of the world's leading orchestras, including London Symphony Orchestra, BBC Symphony, and Lucerne Festival Contemporary Orchestra, in contexts ranging from the Royal Opera House to the Venice Biennale, and with collaborators spanning visual artists Matthew Barney and Cerith Wyn Evans to composers Sir George Benjamin and Elaine Mitchener. He is a co-director of London Contemporary

Music Festival ('The capital's most adventurous and ambitious festival of new music' The Guardian). Jack's own music encompasses orchestral and chamber music to installations and site-specific performance works, and his latest album – *The Vestige* – with Giuseppe Ielasi, was released this week on Black Truffle.

Sinfonia Smith Square is the coming together of two much-loved organisations: Southbank Sinfonia and St John's Smith Square. At its heart is an ambitious Fellowship programme – a beacon for the future of classical music. Welcoming 34 talented musicians each year to form an orchestra, the programme intensifies their professional development and advances their musical careers through world-class collaborations, bold programming, and educational leadership projects. Subsequently becoming leaders in the classical music world, many of the orchestra's more than 650 alumni continue to play a valued role in Sinfonia Smith Square, returning to coach the musicians and perform as paid extras.

Bold Tendencies is a not-for-profit arts organisation established in the rooftop spaces of Peckham's Multi-Storey Car Park in 2007. It has transformed a disused building in the heart of South London into an iconic, much-loved place of culture and assembly with spectacular views out over the city and pioneering architecture project Frank's Cafe. Supporting a new generation of creative voices alongside acclaimed international artists, it delivers an ambitious annual programme of Visual Arts, Creative Learning and Live Events open to the public, offering access, participation and enjoyment of the arts for everyone.
